


Figure 3.54 Summary of the main branches of the musculocutaneous(A) and median(B) nerves.




Figure 3.55 Summary of the main branches of the ulnar nerve.




Figure 3.57 Summary of the main branches of the radial nerve.

Radial n.


- Lateral, thumb side of forearm

Median n.


- Travels down anterior midline of arm

Ulnar n.


- Medial, "pinky" side of forearm




Dorsal side
of hand




Note: Schematic demarcation of dermatomes

overlap between adjacent dermatomes.






Ulnar Nerve

Branches:

I. Cutaneous branches to the skin of:

Medial 1/3 of palm and dorsum of the hand, & medial 1 1/2 fingers (palmar and dorsal aspects).

II. Muscular branches: Supplies all muscles of the hand EXCEPT those which are supplied by median nerve.

Branches:

I. Cutaneous branches to the skin of:

Lateral 2/3 of the palm, palmar aspect of lateral 3 1/2 fingers, the nail beds and dorsum of terminal phalanges of these fingers.

II. Muscular branches: Supplies muscles of thenar eminence + lateral 2 lumbricals.
